If you previously signed up for the national conference in Raleigh (cancelled in 2020 due to COVID), you will be

automatically signed up for the rescheduled conference in Houston, October 8-10, 2021, **provided that you did not previously opt for a refund of your conference registration fees.**

It was a challenging decision to move the national conference from June to October, but we relied upon the best information available and feel hopeful that the trying circumstances of these past months will have subsided substantially enough to hold a successful and well-attended conference in Houston.
